RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS

Ministry, Masonry and Money!

Back in November I wrote about church buildings, especially the hundreds of ancient churches in Suffolk alone, each worth a visit. There are three key reasons why people have an interest in church:

You are engaged in the spiritual side of church You are engaged in the community-oriented side of church You love the history and architecture of church buildings



Most of us who show an interest in church sit somewhere in a triangle between these three. I, for example, am chiefly interested in the spiritual and community aspects. Others are very interested in the building for its history, and place in community.

Church is an expensive activity. At the local level everything is paid for through donations, fees (for weddings and funerals), and some fundraising activity. There is no government subsidy. There is no mythical deep pot of money by which the church funds itself. And those expenses cover (chiefly):

Clergy: paying for a rector to live and work here, the training of future priests and the support of the church hierarchy and the diocesan office.

Buildings: paying for the insurance, upkeep, repair and heating.

While those who are regular churchgoers are the greater beneficiaries of having clergy, it is important to know that I am here for everyone. The regulars also benefit from the church buildings, of course, but these churches can be enjoyed by anyone - they are all open during daylight hours for quiet prayer or to look around. They add history and character to each village. They are an asset regardless of whether you go to church.

And this leads me to ask if you could support your local church... each PCC is grateful for all kinds of donations, regular or one-off, or as a legacy in your will. You can make donations or legacies for the general running, or restrict the purpose of your donation - we will honour the intended use of that gift or legacy: be it church fabric or church in general.

I am so grateful and amazed at the generosity I see every day. I hope and pray not only that church worship will continue in each village long after we are all gone, but also that each church building will continue to be an accessible, beautiful community space for generations to come.



UNDERSTANDING THE HISTORY OF THE BIBLE



Just as it is important to understand that the Bible has different writing styles, which should be read in different ways, so it is also helpful to have a mental picture of the overall narrative of the Bible. Armed with a sense of when things happen, which books and people fit in each period makes reading the Bible especially the old Testament - much easier to navigate.

I break the narrative down into 12 chunks.

1. Beginnings

The Bible starts in Genesis with the creation, Adam and Eve, their expulsion from the garden of Eden, then Cain and Abel (the first murder), which signals a moral downward slide before Noah

and the flood, and the tower of Babel.

1. Patriarchs ≈1850BC

The rest of Genesis covers the patriarchs, the first believers in the Lord. Abraham is called from Ur to Canaan and makes a covenant with the Lord. His son is Isaac; his is Jacob, who tricks and is tricked, sees a ladder up to heaven, has twelve sons. One of these is Joseph (of the technicolour dream-coat) who is sold into slavery in Egypt, but ends up saving his family from famine.

2. Exodus ≈1250BC

Hundreds of years later, the Israelites are now slaves in Egypt. God calls Moses to lead his people, there are 10 plagues, they have the first passover, and cross the Red Sea. In the desert for 40 years God feeds the Israelites on manna, gives them the 10 commandments and the law.

3. Joshua and Judges

Moses's successor, Joshua, leads a conquest of Canaan, including Jericho, where the walls falls down. But the new settlers repeatedly fail to remember what God has done for them, and they mess up. They are rescued by 'judges' including Deborah, Gideon and Samson, but the country descends into anarchy.

4. Monarchy ≈1000BC

The people ask God for a king. Saul, the first king, turns out to be no good. David, the shepherd boy who defeats Goliath, has many adventures and becomes Israel's best ever king, but he is far from faultless. Solomon succeeds him, prays for wisdom and builds the temple in Jerusalem, but ends up failing as a king.

5. Division ≈930BC

Solomon's son, Rehoboam is cruel and the country splits into Israel (in the north, under Jeroboam) 6 and Judah (in the South). In each of these kingdoms a succession of faithless kings rule badly. Israel is worse, and is conquered by Assyria in 722BC. Judah has a few good kings. Prophets such as Elijah and Jeremiah speak truth to power. The first parts of the Bible are written.

6. Exile – 587BC

Jerusalem falls to Babylon, the temple is destroyed and the people exiled. Ezekiel gives hope, the Medes and the Persians defeat Babylon, Daniel survives the lion's den, Esther is made queen of Persia.

7. Start of Return – 539BC

Cyrus allows the Hebrews to return home. Zerubabbel rebuilds the temple, Ezra teaches and reforms, Nehemiah rebuilds Jerusalem's walls. Jews renew their covenant vows.

8. Gap ≈ 400BC to 6BC

Most Bibles include nothing of this period. The Persians ruled until 336BC, when Alexander conquered the whole of the middle east. Greek becomes the common language. In 166BC Judas Maccabaeus leads a revolt. The Romans rule from 63BC, setting up Herod the Great as a puppet king in 40BC. During this time hopes for a 'messiah', a new king appointed by God, rise.

9. Jesus ≈6BC to 27AD

Jesus is born in Bethlehem, and grows up in Nazareth. He announces the kingdom of God with words and miracles, attracting the enmity of those in power, Jewish and Roman. He is falsely tried and crucified, but rises from the dead, and ascends to heaven.

10. The early church ≈27AD

The church grows rapidly, despite persecution. 'Acts' charts this growth, focussing on Peter, then Paul and his missionary journeys which take the good news across Turkey and Greece to Rome.

11. The end — ?AD

The Bible finishes at the book of Revelation. Written in a time of persecution, this book is honest about difficulties but foresees God's kingdom coming, evil defeated and Jesus' return...

This is a long narrative that contains many good stories. Having a stronger sense of what has happened and what is to come in the story, whatever part we read, can provide us vital context to make sense of what we are reading, and that in turn makes it more enjoyable and more meaningful.

Some Bibles include a timeline and maps in the front or back cover. These are incredibly helpful. I'd recommend looking at this if you're ever reading the Bible and don't know when or where you are in the story!



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

DUNWICH HEATH

Spring is in the air, though to be fair it feels like it has been since the start of February! There are signs of nature waking up for the warmer months ahead, with the first buds on the trees and wildlife appearing more and more frequently. As a result, our ranger has finished all of his more disruptive conservation work on the heath and will now focus more on the low-key work, and surveys of the wildlife. One important thing to mention now spring is here, is that dogs must be on a lead while on site (unless on our woof walk) so as not to disrupt the ground-nesting birds which are just coming into nesting season. It also prevents your dog getting a nasty surprise from an adder should they wander into the undergrowth and disturb one!

In terms of what's coming up this month, it's a little quieter with Easter just over the horizon, but we do have our penultimate Turbulence to Tranquillity history talk and the first of our early morning birdsong walks. These are where our ranger takes you out on to the heath to listen for the wide array of beautiful birdsong that can be heard in the early hours at this time of year, with breakfast and a hot drink at the end to warm up. Tickets and more information are on our website, but do book early as these walks usually sell out fast!

Looking ahead, as mentioned Easter isn't far away, and as usual we will have an Easter egg trail running over the bank holiday weekend, with all sorts of nature themed fun to take part in as you head round, with a chocolate treat at the end. There is a non-chocolate prize if you would prefer, or if trails aren't your style we will still have the geo-caching, den building, tracker packs and of course our miles of walks across the beautiful heath. We look forward to seeing you soon!

MIDDLETON WI NEWS

At our January 2023 meeting Gary Doy came to talk about his service with the Southwold Lifeboat. He has recently retired but his service began in 1980 when he needed to be rescued. Before they would do so, he was made to promise that he himself would join the lifeboat crew! A fisherman by trade, his father and his grandfather had also been lifeboat volunteers. He worked his way up from "newbie" crew to Station Operations Manager who says nay or yay to the boat going out. On the books there are 19 crew and a doctor. Training used to be done as you went along, with a year's probation before you were allowed to join permanently. Now the training is by the book and there is even a Lifeboat College in Poole.

The beginning of the Southwold Lifeboat service was in 1841 when there were two boats on the beach. In 1928 the boats were moved to the harbour and in 1940 the largest boat went to Dunkirk. After the war a small boat was kept in the garage of the Harbour Inn and a slipway was used to launch into the river. Now, kept in the 'Shed' in the harbour and launched by crane and pushed out on tracks into the water, is a state-of-the-art Atlantic 85 inflatable boat. Hand built on the Isle of Wight, this £250 million (donated by Tranmere House, Sutton Hoo) can go 6.2 knots (45 mph), has an electronic plotter with screen, uses water as ballast in the bow and is open at the back. The crew of four are strapped in by their feet: helmsman, radio operator, navigator, and "eyes" at the back (usually a newbie). When there is a call the boat can be launched in 10 or 11 minutes. Every volunteer has their own kit hanging in the shed. The kit consists of a full body fleece that goes under an all in one waterproof suit with boots attached

and many outside pockets for gloves, medical cards etc. The lifejacket has satellite positioning, flares, whistle, hood with windscreen and buddy lines to hook members together if needed. When inflated the jacket can act as a life raft. The crash helmet has inflatable insides for a secure fit, and a microphone to talk to other crew.

The "shouts" are usually for breakdowns, dogs in the river, kite surfers, swimmers, searches, and drifting inflatables. If any medical treatment is given during the rescue, it must be recorded on the medical card accurately.

Unfortunately litigation is common these days, people will sue even when being rescued. There are about 18-19 shouts a year in the Southwold-Sizewell area, a reduction compared to past years which might be due to better health and safety education of the public.

Recruitment for the lifeboat these days is getting harder. There are not as many young people living and working locally as there were and fewer businesses who are willing to let their employees go off when needed. In the past most of the lifeboat volunteers were fisherman or worked for Adnam's Brewery.

Our next meeting will be Wednesday the 15th of March at 7:15pm. Victoria Hayden will give us a talk on Pilates. All are welcome.


PEASENHALL PHOTOGRAPHY PROJECTS

1. Thermal imaging project - this is a project of Warmer Suffolk, who lend villages a thermal imaging camera. It records the image from the Infra Red spectrum, and the colours show the hot and cold spots in your homes. I photographed about 20 homes around the village and gave a brief consultation about where and how they could save money, and improve comfort, with insulation etc. Grants and advice are accessed from the Warmer Suffolk and Groundworks East websites.

2. Positive Peasenhall Photo project - grant funding (for several projects in the village) paid for a Photography competition and exhibition of photos taken by local residents (ages ranging from 5yrs to retired). Cash prizes were awarded for several themes, and visitors to the exhibition voted on Best in Show, which was won by Lorraine Thickitt.

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

STOP SIZEWELL C

While it's been a seemingly eventful time for Sizewell C, there is still at least a year before we know whether or not it will get the final go ahead. Here's a recap on where we are and a few reasons it might still never happen.

Money. The UK government now jointly owns Sizewell C, however other investors must still be found before construction can go ahead. Pension Funds are still wavering. On 1 February the Daily Mail reported that two of the UK's top funds - BT and NatWest - won't back Sizewell C, joining Nest, and the UK's biggest infrastructure investor, Legal & General who already said "no". Stop Sizewell C has launched a new advertising campaign in the City of London, calling on Fund Managers to "Pension Off" Sizewell C, and is appealing to supporters to help by writing to their Pension Fund. See <u>www.</u> stopsizewellc.org/pension. consent is being challenged by Together Against Sizewell C, supported by ourselves and Suffolk Coastal Friends of the Earth, with a two-day hearing in March. Meanwhile the "EPR" reactor continues to give concern: commercial operation of Finland's Olkiluoto 3 has been postponed yet again and EDF has announced more delays and cost increases for Flamanville 3 in France.

Politics & Timing. Sizewell C's new owners all agree it will be 12-18 months until a Final Investment Decision is made, and with Rishi Sunak splitting up Whitehall to create a new Department for Energy Security and Net Zero, we can be confident the next few weeks will be taken up with deciding where everyone will sit!
