RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS



Anglican Diversity

One of the strengths of being a Christian in the countryside is the *lack* of choice of churches. Mostly, to get to any other church than an Anglican church you have to drive. As a consequence, the churches in the Yoxmere Benefice are a spiritual home to people from a few different church backgrounds — and we get along fine!

The Church of England broke from Catholicism during the English Reformation. Yes, Henry VIII wanted a divorce, but the Reformation was in full swing across Europe at that time: Luther began a fervent wave of Christian thought about both theology and worship — so Henry VIII took advantage of wider reformation to get what he wanted, and English reformers took advantage of his backing to get what they wanted. The result was a protestant church that did not entirely rip up Catholicism, but still brought significant change.

Methodism split from Anglicanism in the eighteenth century, under John Wesley. The Wesleys had an uncommonly deep and passionate faith, which they expressed in outdoor preaching. The Anglican church of the time was too conservative for that sort of thing and booted them out. But there is no theological difference now, nor difference in faith or enthusiasm. We worship alongside each other very happily.

Baptists usually take communion less frequently than Anglicans, are usually less traditional and more modern, and put more emphasis on preaching and the Bible. They baptise only those who can make an informed choice about their faith and this then leads to greater emphasis on the personal than the corporate. These are not irreconcilable differences! Consequently, we have a number of people who grew up Baptist happily blending with the Anglican congregation.

In the end, the Church of England is a wide umbrella, a big melting pot, in which there is great strength in diversity. We are evangelical and reformed and small 'c' catholic; traditional and modern, young and old, and more besides. It is better when we emphasise our commonalities. It is better to meet, pray, sing, read, learn and share together than apart. We think better together when we don't all think alike. And I am pleased to have Christians with lots of different faith stories in the Yoxmere churches, and all are welcome, of any denomination or none, of any faith or none, to any service. Furthermore, there is still room for us to explore more of the breadth of tradition. If you have experienced forms of worship that were meaningful to you in the past, talk to me about them. There is always room to make the house of God more welcoming, and more diverse. *Blessings, Tim.*

THEOLOGY CORNER



The Prophets

When Herman Melville wrote Moby Dick in 1850, he was not simply writing a novel about the captain of a whaling ship who sets himself on revenge against the whale that took his leg. He was writing an urgent message to his country, anxious that the 'ship of state' was off course and needed to turn around. Few got the message, though — and the novel was under-appreciated until well after his death.

This is something like the way the Old Testament prophets wrote. Their urgent message was typically

about calling their nations, Israel and Judah, back to the law and back to faithfulness to the Lord, because the consequences would be dire if they did not return to faithfulness. As such, the prophets' central goal was nothing new — to encourage their leaders and their people to live well under God's laws. But on the way they also shared visions of hope, and gave valuable help in interpreting the law.

If you open a Bible, you will find a group of books towards the end of the Old Testament, starting with Isaiah, and ending with Malachi. These are the books of the prophets. But...just as the Torah, the law, mixed together instruction and story, so the prophets in a Hebrew Bible is the same mix: a Hebrew Bible, a Tanak, puts the books Joshua, Judges, Samuel and Kings together with the named prophets, because these books have much to do with the message of the prophets, and because their words can only be read and understood in the context of the story. Prophets' words are chiefly of their time and for their people, addressing the contemporaneous problems.

So why do we read them? Why are they still a part of the Bible? Firstly, because of the clarification they give, secondly for the hope, thirdly because they help us to understand a wider picture of God's constancy.

Clarification

A year or two ago I read the autobiography of Adrian Newey, the legendary F1 car designer. For him, designing a car is about looking for every potential loophole in the rules and exploiting them. A significant message of the prophets is not to read the law like Adrian Newey(!) and the spirit of the law was more important than looking for loopholes. So they clarify that God wants us to 'do justly, love mercy, and walk humbly', and that sacrifices are not a 'get out of jail card'.

Hope

While the Old Testament prophets often nagged at their kings and their people, they also offered hope — especially after the destruction of Jerusalem in 587BC. They reminded their people that despite misfortune God was still with them, that God loved them, and that their people would not die out but would be restored to their homeland. One day they would be free again, under the good rule of their Lord. Some of this hope comes as specific expectations and predictions. Isaiah, in particular, points very particularly towards a coming Messiah, and a suffering servant — both of whom we recognise in the one person of Jesus. I still find it remarkable that so many of the prophets' cryptic hints came true.

Constancy

Many would look upon the constantly changing fortunes of Israel as just the sort of thing that happens throughout history, and no proof of a living God. Jews see it differently — how could the Israelite slaves escape Egypt without divine intervention? How could they return home from Babylon and Persia without God pulling the strings? The prophets help us to interpret these ups and downs in fortune. God does not punish Israel, but when they turned from him, he warned them, and withdrew his protection from the nation. As they repented and turned back to him, so God reinstated the fullness of their relationship. Parents love



their children, but they know that wrapping them in cotton wool is not love. They want their children to grow in responsibility and maturity. The prophets communicate these desires of God, helping us to see that the changing fortunes are not due to God's inconstancy, but to the fickleness of the people. They point to a day when God's rule of his people will more obviously be constant — Jesus' kingship over his believers in the New Testament, and thereafter.

The prophets can be tough reading!
They are best read after you have got used to a lot of the other Biblical genres.
But they are really important for our understanding of the world Jesus lived in, and the expectations he went on to fulfil.

Preparing for Net Zero - Part Two, from Greener Peasenhall & Sibton

Someone came up with the notion of 'Net Zero', and attached a future target date on it, giving us all the impression that this would be the answer to carbon emissions. Net Zero doesn't mean \mathbf{zero} – it's not about producing *no* carbon. If there were a machine that could eat carbon, one could have a notion that a steel producer could emit x million tons, and then use that machine to eat x million tons of carbon, so that the net result would be no 'excess' carbon emitted – a net zero event. We don't have machines like that yet, so governments and businesses have to look for alternatives.

Trees were always a good example of something net zero for they breathe in CO_2 and breathe out oxygen, and the growth of the tree becomes a carbon sink (a relatively passive store of carbon, until it rots). Thus, one politician's solution for the climate crisis is to plant trees, but it takes a long time for a tree to develop into maturity – it's a long-term solution, yet it has encouraged the scam of carbon credits which gives landowners tax-payer money for planting saplings.

Very little else is naturally net zero, and humans and our society are not, but we can, and must, *reduce* the amount of carbon we produce, individually and as a society. If we could insulate more, purchase and eat less, and overall generate less carbon, we might be able to 'keep 1.5 alive', but this would still mean accepting the level of climate crisis we are currently in, with its resulting floods, fires and crop failures. For those of us without the land to plant saplings, we'll be persuaded to reduce our carbon footprint by:

- 1. transport reducing traffic (amount/mileage) and increasing cycling
- 2. reducing emissions having smaller/electric cars, and more economic/cooler heating, power, cooking
- 3. house construction including retro-fitting insulation, water conservation
- 4. green corridors planting more
- 5. renewables solar / wind / heat pumps
- 6. waste management reducing waste and managing it correctly
- 7. water flood management / refilling rivers and aquifers / minimising domestic wastage
- 8. food local food / organic / vegetarian / less meat

What will you be prioritising?

In an attempt to highlight energy loss through poor insulation, East Suffolk Council will again be offering free thermal imaging house inspections and consultations by local people, in the winter. Insulation doesn't have to cost a lot, but it helps to know where best to put it. Contact greenpeasen@gmail.com for more information, and/or book a free appointment.

DARSHAM PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met for its monthly meeting on Tuesday 12th September. During the public forum, concerns were raised regarding broken road signage and incorrectly listed cycle routes. The parish council will assist in trying to resolve these issues; however, as part of his report, Cllr Richard Smith cited budget constraints in respect of signage.

Cllr Backhouse provided reports on behalf of three absent councillors, updating the council on progress with the village play space and upcoming events at the village hall on behalf of Cllr Ballantine. In respect of footpaths, Cllr Redgrave and Cllr Backhouse have worked hard to investigate and resolve a right-of-way issue in respect of a footpath along the boundary of Greenside and The Street. It has now been clarified in line with the conditions of the planning permission for the site, that the footpath is a public footpath providing safe passage for pedestrians along a narrow section of The Street.

Cllr Green provided a report on the solar power system at the village hall, which has now been in operation for one full month. The solar power system has provided 90% of the village hall's electricity and all of its hot water, in addition to a healthy

income from the unused electricity sold back to the grid. Cllr Green shared the monthly speed monitoring reports, and noted 83% compliance with the speed limit in August, which is the best result to date. The council agreed to explore the establishment of a Community Speedwatch team and invites any members of the public who wish to be involved to please contact Cllr Green directly.

Cllr Taylor and Cllr Backhouse are continuing to explore the possibility of an additional defibrillator in the village to be sited at All Saints Church. Further defibrillator training will be provided in October, with more details to be published shortly. The council agreed a donation of £50 to SARS for this training.

In respect of planning, the council voted unanimously in favour of the variation to the one planning application to come before the council this month.

Darsham Parish Council's next meeting will be held at 7pm on Tuesday 10th October at Darsham Village Hall. There will be two Sizewell representatives at this meeting and all members of the public are welcome to attend.


