RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS



In the summer of 1996 I was in Nicaragua. Most of my time was spent in a small place called Juigalpa, and my most powerful memory is when hurricane Cesar crossed the country on 17th July. My gap-year team mates and I were sleeping in simple breeze-block huts with zinc roofs (with gunshot holes in — I'm not kidding) and no glass in the windows. It was a pretty scary night.

But the other amazing memory was that we took a trip to the Caribbean coastal town of Bluefields. The mosquitos were huge, the music was Reggae, the language was English with a strongly Caribbean accent, and you wouldn't know you were in Nicaragua at all. It was quite amazing.

Is it for this reason that I'm fond of *Death in Paradise*? Probably not, because this has been one of the most enduringly popular series over the last thirteen years. *Death in Paradise* manages to be a bit of lots of enjoyable things — a crime drama set in a sunny, laid-back climate (great for winter viewing), with fish-out-of-water comedy for its protagonists, and occasional hints at romance. Sunday evening? Don't want anything too heavy? Need a 'nice cosy murder'? *Death in Paradise* fits the bill. It's *Midsomer Murders* with sunnier scenery. Yes, people die, and no, no one ever comments on the high mortality rate of Saint Marie either, because in the end the mystery gets solved and we can all go for a drink at Catherine's Bar and order chicken and chips.

Part of the reason it works is how formulaic the series is. The opening scene introduces guest characters, sets the scene and gives you a body. Before long the DI asks 'What do we know?' and the others give exposition while gathered at the whiteboard. Before you know it, they're talking to British ex-pats with a shady past, and then the DI has a moment of revelation and gathers everyone for the Miss-Marple-style big reveal.

It pays so much debt to Agatha Christie that the main town, Honoré, is named after the location for her novel *A Caribbean Mystery*.

Last year I wrote about *Endeavour*. Lots of people told me how much they, too, enjoyed it. *Death in Paradise* is nothing like it — it lacks the ambition or scope, it lacks the deliberate historical sweep and arch-plot. But it has got a CGI lizard called Harry and a clever twist in the denouement, so it's just what you need before launching into the coming week. I pray you have a good one!

THEOLOGY CORNER



Revelation is the last book of the Bible, and possibly the most extraordinary. It is a letter, written at the end of the first century, from John to various churches spread across Asia Minor. It was a time of persecution, and this letter comes by way of encouragement, though in a remarkable way. Most of the letter consists of visions, full of trial and tribulation, and yet still promising good for the faithful. The climax sees an end to all this trouble: Satan is defeated, God has the victory, and God reveals a new (or rather, renewed) heaven and earth, and a new Jerusalem. God and goodness are victorious, and there will be no more tears or

pain, because all of that has passed.

The style of writing is called 'apocalyptic' by Biblical scholars, which simply means revelatory. But it is a style of writing that can be found in parts of the book of Daniel and Ezekiel in the Old Testament, and in lots of texts that were written by Jewish writers during times of persecution, but which fall outside the Bible. The imagery is larger than life, and not to be taken literally. Numbers are significant, and have a meaning and, again, are not be taken literally. So, for example, the number seven signifies *completeness*, more than it does simply a numeral between six and eight. Some have called this 'God's picture book' because of the reliance on startling images. Imagery is drawn from across the rest of the Bible. So for example, when we 'see' God's throne room, we are told of a rainbow (reminding us of God's promise to Noah), thunder and lightning (as there was on Mount Sinai), and in front of the throne is a 'sea of glass', a reminder for the well read of the inner room of the Jerusalem Temple. As such, revelation is highly allusive, drawing much of the rest of the Bible into itself for its final analysis.

Apocalyptic writing, this sub-genre of prophetic writing, evolved particularly during times of persecution. In this it shares much in common with the comic book *Superman*, which provides a helpful comparison.

Superman was conceived by Jerry Siegel and artist Joe Shuster in 1938, as Nazism in Germany was increasing in both its persecution of Jews and its threat of war. Siegel and Shuster, both American Jews, saw what was happening and felt powerless to help. They were drawn to create a great hero who would battle the inconceivably powerful forces of evil, and win the victory. It wouldn't all be plain sailing, but his victory would be assured. This was Superman, a messianic figure, come to win the cosmic battle of good and evil. Superman's Krypton name, Kal-el, sounds quite close to the Hebrew for 'voice of God'.

Other superheroes — Captain America, Wonder Woman and Batman — arrived soon after, following the same formula: super-powered heroes and villains in a battle of good and evil. The 'golden age' of comic books was born as the Second World War was raging. I don't think it is a coincidence that the 'silver age' of comic books occurred during the 1960s, coinciding with the Cold War and the Cuban missile crisis, nor that Marvel's spectacular success in the cinema has all happened since 9/11.

Apocalyptic writing, similarly, became popular as a means of 'processing' a people's hopes for the great struggle of good and evil whenever persecution was at its greatest. Just as comic books have their own language, rules and expectations, so too does Revelation and other apocalyptic writings.

There are two things that I suggest will help in reading Revelation. Firstly, don't take the images literally. If it talks of stars falling, think of 'earth-shattering events'; if it mentions locusts, don't think of insects, so much as whether they represent the armies of mighty tyrannical nations destroying all in their path.

Secondly, the book goes through various scenes in turn: seven seals opened, seven bowls poured out, and so on. This is not necessarily one long narrative of events, but perhaps separate ways of looking at the present and the future, much like if I were to talk about God as Trinity I might suggest God is like the leaves of a clover, or like the sun and its rays and the warmth. I wouldn't be implying either that God looked like a shamrock, or that over time God was first a shamrock, and then the sun. We would understand that these are both images that are reaching at the limits of language to describe that which is beyond our experience or comprehension.

Revelation is a remarkable book, very worth reading — especially with a commentary beside you. It is a book full of hope and expectation, and assurance for us, during our own often troubled and difficult times.



DARSHAM PARISH COUNCIL

The council held a well-attended meeting on Tuesday 12th March.

County Councillor Richard Smith's report touched on the impact of the LionLink project in our area, which was seconded by District Councillor Paul Ashton. Due to the impact of the project in Darsham, councillors agreed to establish a subcommittee for LionLink, to be co-ordinated by Cllr Taylor. A response will be submitted by 4th April to the environmental impact assessment, and members of the public are encouraged to share their views.

The Village Hall requested the Parish Council's help with the raffle and tombola at this year's village fete, to which all councillors agreed. The hall's treasurer, Paul Diamond, also gave a brief presentation on his efforts to unlock historic community funds for Darsham, in which the Parish Council has agreed to assist.

Although flooding continues to be an issue, progress has been made on The Street, with Denbury Homes conducting a site visit and agreeing to carry out remedial works to the ditches fronting the Greenside development which appear to be the cause of the issues.

Two planning applications were discussed, one of which related to the proposed village playground, and both were supported by the council by way of a majority vote. Cllr Ballantine noted that Suffolk Highways' response to the proposed 110-home development south of Darsham station at the A12/Westleton Road junction has been amended to be in favour of the development, subject to the provision of a formal signalised crossing over the A12.

Darsham Parish Council's next meeting will take place on Tuesday 9th April at 7.00pm in Darsham Village Hall.

Also inadequate were the houses which disposed of the waste in their small gardens. Many houses disposed of their waste in the allotments opposite the Village Hall which was considered adequate. A very enlightening talk!

VILLAGE MATTERS

Update following the floods since October 2023: Work continues in the village to minimise risk of future flooding. You may have seen the reappearance of the white railings now that Suffolk County Council has cleared the gully along the A12. East Suffolk Council completed a road sweep and so the village is beginning to look clearer.

Village green areas: The Parish Council has awarded this coming season's grass-cutting contract to SCL Landscapes and looks forward to working with this new team to shape the village's green spaces for the benefit of everyone.

Volunteering Matters: You'll see our fabulous village volunteers out and about at various times. If you're able to join the team, please let the Parish Clerk know or just turn up at the Village Hall at 10am on either **April 20th & 21st** - tasks to be finalised.

Sizewell C: The yellow notification signs of the Sizewell project are hard to ignore and significant works are beginning. The resurfacing of sections of Yoxford Rd, the B1122, towards Middleton & Leiston is due to be completed by April 14th. Council has been informed that the majority of work will occur at night when the road will be closed (from 7pm to 6am). Escorted access for residents and business will be available at all times. Diversion signs will be in place. A letter from Sizewell which details this work will be posted on the Parish Council's noticeboard and online.

Due to these works, some residents will now have been contacted by Sizewell regarding its Noise Mitigation Scheme. Residents affected by noise from the road works will be able to apply for measures to reduce impact. **The Parish Council is available to support anyone with an application.**


